- At least 64MB of memory and a 500MHz processor

Introduction

D-Link's *AirPremier*® line of networking products combine powerful business class features with a high-performance hardware platform specifically designed for corporate environments. The *AirPremier*® line of networking products now adds wireless client adapters to its lineup including the DWL-G680 High-Powered Wireless 108G Notebook Adapter.

Powered by D-Link 108G Technology, this High-Powered Notebook Adapter is capable of delivering a maximum wireless signal rate of up to 108Mbps* when used with other D-Link Wireless 108G devices. The DWL-G680 is also backward compatible with virtually all 802.11b/g networks and devices.

The high-powered output featured on the DWL-G680 offers extended wireless signal reception while adhering to industry standards. Higher output power allows this client device to receive and maintain strong signals from wireless routers and access points at further distances – this translates into more useable, real-world throughput from virtually anywhere in your wireless network.

The new business-class wireless LAN utility included with this device is capable of storing multiple SSIDs per profile. What this means to the notebook user is a hassle-free and automatic process when transitioning between or changing networks. Each time a user enters an area under a different SSID, the notebook adapter will automatically connect to the respective SSID to ensure a positive roaming experience. IT managers will also appreciate the Silent Installation feature of the DWL-G680. With this feature, the drivers can be configured to automatically install on the backend reducing the time needed to process and configure wireless network settings.

For accessing secure networks, this Wireless Notebook Adapter supports both Personal and Enterprise versions of WPA and WPA2. Now you can utilize EAP-TLS, EAP-TTLS and PEAP for secure user authentication through an 802.1x RADIUS server. Data traversing the wireless network is encrypted using either TKIP or AES.

The DWL-G680 can be used in peer-to-peer mode (ad-hoc) to directly connect to other 802.11b/g wirelessly enabled computers for direct file sharing, or in client mode (infrastructure) to connect with wireless access points or routers.

In addition to Wi-Fi certification for 802.11b and 11g, the DWL-G680 is also certified by Microsoft's WHQL, to ensure compatibility with Microsoft Windows® XP and 2000. These certifications ensure both wireless compatibility, robust data encryption, and reliable performance. A perfect complement for your *AirPremier* wireless network, this High-Powered Wireless 108G Notebook Adapter is a convenient solution for providing superior wireless connectivity for your notebook PC.

Wireless Basics

D-Link wireless products are based on industry standards to provide easy-to-use and compatible high-speed wireless connectivity within your home, business or public access wireless networks. D-Link wireless products will allow you access to the data you want, when and where you want it. You will be able to enjoy the freedom that wireless networking brings.

A wireless local area network (WLAN) is a computer network that transmits and receives data with radio signals instead of wires. WLANs are used increasingly in both home and office environments, and public areas such as airports, coffee shops and universities. Innovative ways to utilize WLAN technology are helping people to work and communicate more efficiently. Increased mobility and the absence of cabling and other fixed infrastructure have proven to be beneficial to many users.

Wireless users can use the same applications they use on a wired network. Wireless adapter cards used on laptop and desktop systems support the same protocols as Ethernet adapter cards.

People use WLAN technology for many different purposes:

Mobility - Productivity increases when people have access to data in any location within the operating range of the WLAN. Management decisions based on real-time information can significantly improve worker efficiency.

Low Implementation Costs - WLANs are easy to set up, manage, change and relocate. Networks that frequently change can benefit from WLANs ease of implementation. WLANs can operate in locations where installation of wiring may be impractical.

Installation and Network Expansion - Installing a WLAN system can be fast and easy and can eliminate the need to pull cable through walls and ceilings. Wireless technology allows the network to go where wires cannot go - even outside the home or office.

Inexpensive Solution - Wireless network devices are as competitively priced as conventional Ethernet network devices.

Scalability - WLANs can be configured in a variety of ways to meet the needs of specific applications and installations. Configurations are easily changed and range from Peer-to-Peer networks suitable for a small number of users to larger Infrastructure networks to accommodate hundreds or thousands of users, depending on the number of wireless devices deployed.

Standards-Based Technology

The DWL-G680 Wireless 108G Notebook Adapter utilizes the **802.11g** standard.

The IEEE **802.11g** standard is an extension of the 802.11b standard. It increases the data rate up to 54Mbps within the 2.4GHz band, utilizing **OFDM technology**.

This means that in most environments, within the specified range of this device, you will be able to transfer large files quickly or even watch a movie in MPEG format over your network without noticeable delays. This technology works by transmitting high-speed digital data over a radio wave utilizing **OFDM (Orthogonal Frequency Division Multiplexing)** technology. **OFDM** works by splitting the radio signal into multiple smaller sub-signals that are then transmitted simultaneously at different frequencies to the receiver. **OFDM** reduces the amount of **crosstalk** (interference) in signal transmissions. The D-Link DWL-G680 will automatically sense the best possible connection speed to ensure the greatest speed and range possible.

802.11g offers the most advanced network security features available today, including: WPA , 802.1x, TKIP, AES and Pre-Shared Key mode. These security features are explained in more detail in the *Introduction* section of this manual.

The DWL-G680 is backwards compatible with 802.11b devices. This means that if you have an existing 802.11b network, the devices in that network will be compatible with 802.11g devices at speeds up to 11Mbps in the 2.4GHz range. Also based on the IEEE **802.11b** standard, the DWL-G680 is interoperable with existing compatible 2.4GHz wireless technology with data transfer speeds of up to 11Mbps.

Installation Considerations

The DWL-G680 lets you access your network using a wireless connection from virtually anywhere within its operating range. Keep in mind, however, that the number, thickness and location of walls, ceilings, or other objects that the wireless signals must pass through, may limit the range. Typical ranges vary depending on the types of materials and background RF (radio frequency) noise in your home or business. The key to maximizing wireless range is to follow these basic guidelines:

- Keep the number of walls and ceilings between the DWL-G680 and other network devices to a minimum - each wall or ceiling can reduce your DWL-G680's range from 3-90 feet (1-30 meters.) Position your devices so that the number of walls or ceilings is minimized.
- Be aware of the direct line between network devices. A wall that is 1.5 feet thick (.5 meters), at a 45-degree angle appears to be almost 3 feet (1 meter) thick. At a 2-degree angle it looks over 42 feet (14 meters) thick! Position devices so that the signal will travel straight through a wall or ceiling (instead of at an angle) for better reception.
- Building materials can impede the wireless signal - a solid metal door or aluminum studs may have a negative effect on range. Try to position wireless devices and computers with wireless adapters so that the signal passes through drywall or open doorways and not other materials.
- Keep your product away (at least 3-6 feet or 1-2 meters) from electrical devices or appliances that generate RF noise.

Getting Started

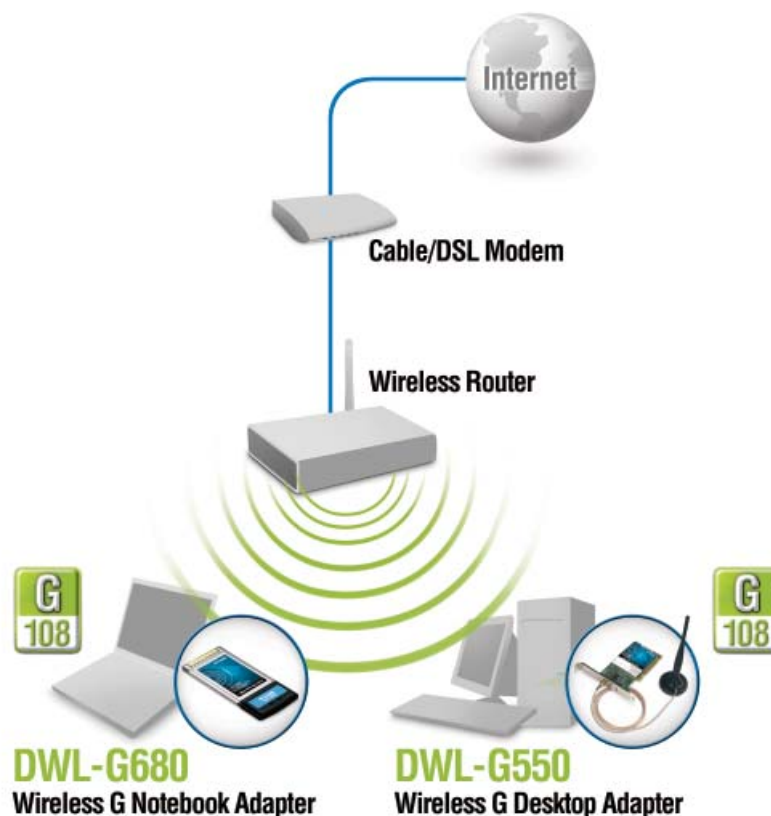
There are basically two modes of networking:

Infrastructure – using an access point or router, such as the DI-624.

Ad-Hoc – directly connecting to another computer, for Peer-to-Peer communication, using wireless network adapters on each computer, such as two or more DWL-G680 Wireless Laptop adapters.

On the following pages we will show you an example of an **Infrastructure Network** and an **Ad-Hoc Network**.

An **Infrastructure** network contains an access point or router.



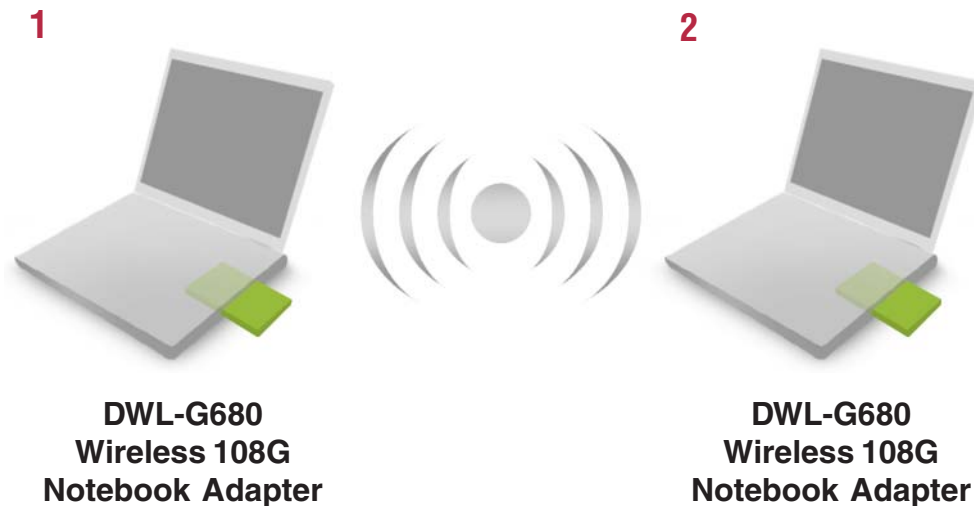


Setting up a Wireless Infrastructure Network

For a typical wireless setup at home, please do the following:

- 1** You will need broadband Internet access (a cable or DSL-subscriber line into your home or office).
- 2** Consult with your cable or DSL provider for proper installation of the modem.
- 3** Connect the cable or DSL modem to your broadband router.
(See the *Quick Installation Guide* included with your router.)
- 4** Install the D-Link DWL-G680 Wireless 108G Notebook Adapter into an available Cardbus slot on your laptop computer.
(See the *Quick Installation Guide* included with the DWL-G680.)
- 5** Install another D-Link DWL-G680 Wireless 108G Notebook Adapter into an available Cardbus slot on your laptop computer.
(See the *Quick Installation Guide* included with the DWL-G680.)
- 6** Configure your wireless adapters with the same SSID and security settings, if any, as your access point or wireless router.

Setting up a Wireless Ad-Hoc Network



For a typical wireless setup at home (as shown above), please do the following:

- 1** Install the **D-Link DWL-G680 Wireless 108G Notebook Adapter** into the laptop computer. *(See the Quick Installation Guide included with the product.)*
- 2** Install the other **D-Link DWL-G680 Wireless 108G Notebook Adapter** into the laptop computer. *(See the Quick Installation Guide included with the product.)*
- 3** Set the wireless configuration for the adapters to Ad-Hoc mode, set the adapters to the same channel, and assign an IP address to each computer on the Ad-Hoc network.

IP Address

When assigning IP addresses to the computers on the network, please remember that the **IP address for each computer must be in the same IP address range as all the computers in the network**, and the subnet mask must be exactly the same for all the computers in the network.

For example: If the first computer is assigned an IP address of 192.168.0.2 with a subnet mask of 255.255.255.0, then the second computer can be assigned an IP address of 192.168.0.3 with a subnet mask of 255.255.255.0, etc.

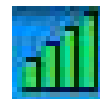
IMPORTANT: If computers or other devices are assigned the same IP address, one or more of the devices may not be visible on the network.

Using the Configuration Utility

D-Link DWL-G680 Wireless 108G Notebook Adapter uses the **Configuration Utility** as the management software. The utility provides the user an easy interface to change any settings related to the wireless adapter. After you have completed the installation of the DWL-G680 (refer to the *Quick Installation Guide* that came with your purchase) whenever you start the computer, the **Configuration Utility** starts automatically and the system tray icon is loaded in the toolbar (see illustration below.*) Clicking on the utility icon will start the **Configuration Utility**.

If you are using Windows XP, you can use either the Zero Configuration Utility or the D-Link Configuration Utility.

To use the D-Link Configuration Utility with XP, right-click on the wireless network icon in the taskbar in the lower right-hand corner of your computer screen.



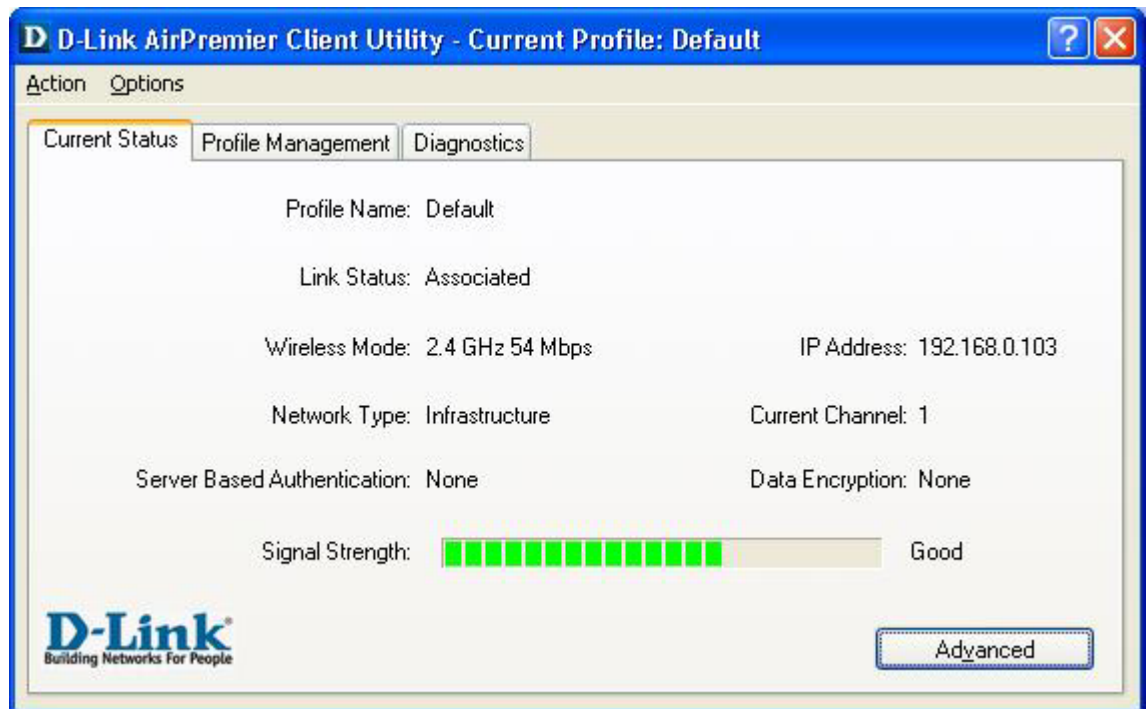
You can then use the D-Link Configuration Utility with XP by right-clicking on the white D-Link Configuration Utility icon.



If the icon does not display in the taskbar, then click on this icon on your desktop to open.



Current Status



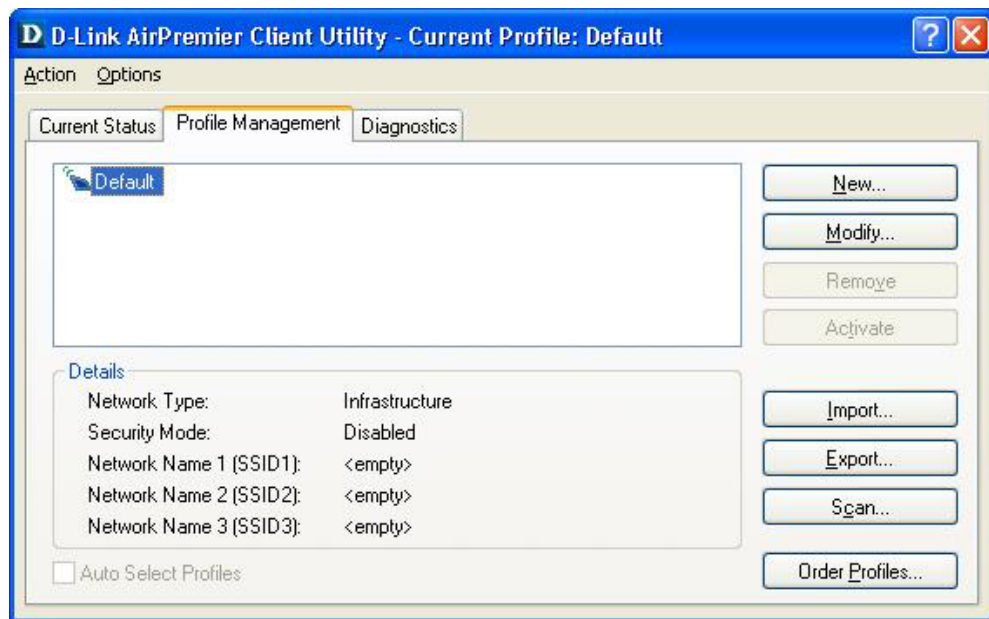
Profile Name:	Displays the current profile being used.
Link Status:	Displays the adapter's connection to the network.
Wireless Mode:	Displays the wireless mode.
IP Address:	Displays the IP address of the DWL-G680.
Network Type:	The factory setting is set to Infrastructure. Ad-Hoc mode is used for peer-to-peer networking.
Current Channel:	Displays the channel information. By default, the channel is set to 6 and selection is automatically determined by the DWL-G680.
Server Based Authentication:	Displays if using 802.1x authentication.
Data Encryption:	Displays the current encryption level.
Signal Strength:	Represents the wireless signal between the access point and the DWL-680. The percentage coincides with the graphical bar.
Advanced:	Click the Advanced button to display more specific information regarding your wireless connection.

The Advanced screen will display specific information regarding your wireless network.

Profile Management - Overview



- New:** To create a new profile, click the New button.
- Modify:** To edit the network information of an existing profile, highlight a profile from the list and click the Modify button.
- Remove:** To delete an existing profile, highlight a profile and click the Remove button. If the profile is in use (activated), this option will not be available.
- Activate:** To use a profile from the list, highlight the profile and click the Activate button.
- Import:** Click the Import button to load a saved profile.
- Export:** Save an existing profile by clicking the Export button. You may load a saved profile by clicking the Import button.
- Scan:** Launches the site survey tool which will detect all available wireless networks.
- Order Profiles:** Change the order of existing profiles.

Profile Management - Create/Modify a Profile

From the Profile Management menu select **Add** to create a new profile or **Modify** to edit an existing profile. The following screen will appear:

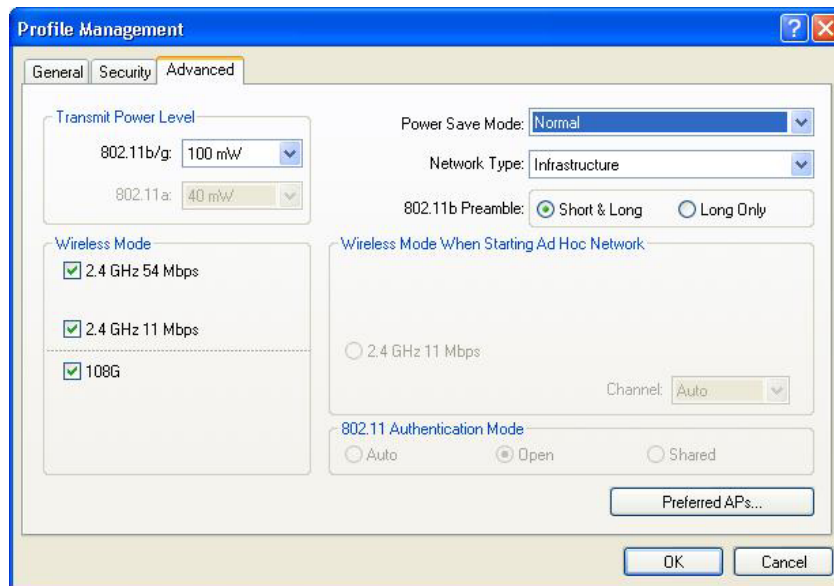
Profile Name: Enter a name of your profile.

Client Name: Enter a client name.

Network Names: The Service Set Identifier (SSID) is the name assigned to the wireless network. You may enter up to 3 network names (SSIDs).

Click the **Security** tab to enter the encryption information for your wireless network (see page 21). The Advanced tab will allow you to configure your wireless network.

Profile Management - Advanced



Transmit Power Level: Select the amount of power transmission of the antenna.

Wireless Mode: Select the wireless mode of your wireless network.
2.4GH/54Mbps - Connect to an 802.11b/g network.
2.4GH/11Mbps - Connect to an 802.11b only network.
108G - Connect to an 802.11g network using Super G.

Power Save Mode: Select the amount of power the DWL-G680 will use.

Network Type: Select the network type from the pull-down menu.
Infrastructure - Connect to an access point or router.
Ad-Hoc - Connect to another wireless client (peer-to-peer).

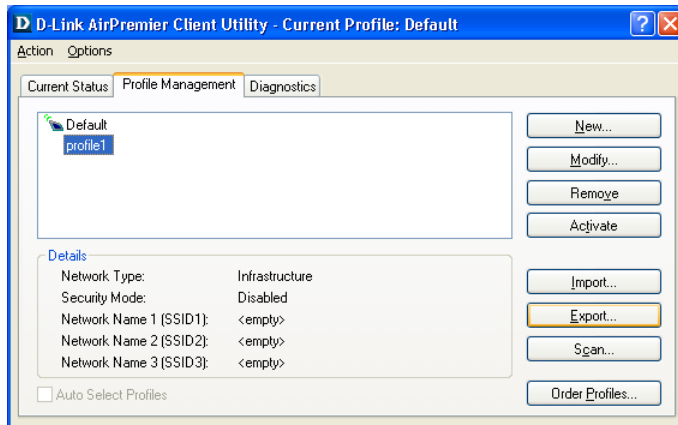
802.11b Preamble: Select either Short & Long (default) or Long Only.

Wireless Mode When Starting Ad-Hoc Mode: If your network type is Ad-Hoc, the following options will be available:
2.4GHz 11Mbps - Select if connecting to an 802.11b only client.
Channel - The channel must be the same on the other wireless clients to connect.

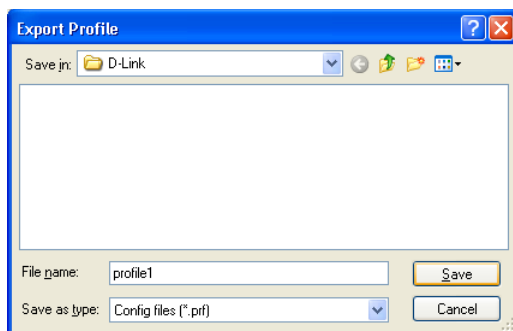
802.11 Authentication Mode: Select one of the following:
Auto - The DWL-G680 will select the best authentication mode for your network.
Open - the adapter is visible to all devices on the network.
Shared - allows communication only with other devices with identical WEP settings.

Profile Management - Import/Export Profiles

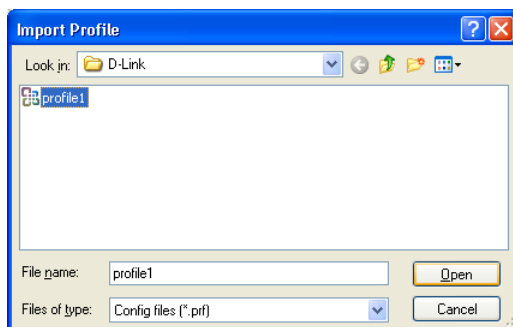
You can save profiles to your computer by using the Export function. This will allow you to copy to a disk and load a profile containing your wireless network configuration settings to another computer using the DWL-G680.



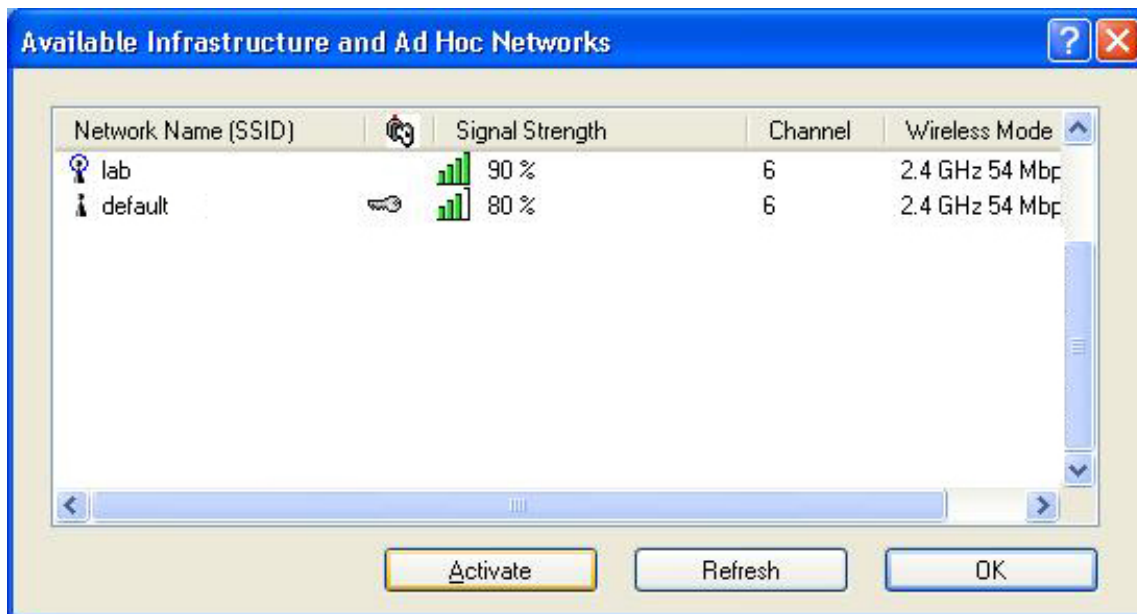
To save a profile, highlight the profile you would like to save and click the Export button. Select the location and click Save.



To load a profile, click the Import button. Select the profile you want to load and click Open. The profile will now be located in the Profile Management list. To use the loaded settings, highlight the profile and click Activate.



Profile Management - Scan (Site Survey)



Network Name (SSID): The Service Set Identifier is the name assigned to the wireless network. The factory SSID setting is **default**.

Security: If a key icon is displayed, the wireless network is using either WEP or WPA security. You must know the security settings to connect to a secure network.

Signal Strength: Displays the signal strength of the wireless network.

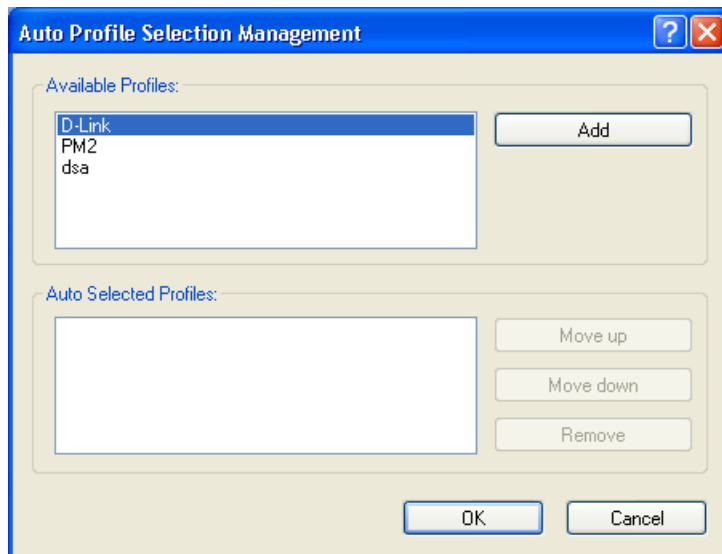
Channel: The channel selection is automatically determined by the DWL-G680. When in Ad-Hoc mode, you may select a channel manually. The default channel is 6.

Wireless Mode: Displays the type of wireless network.

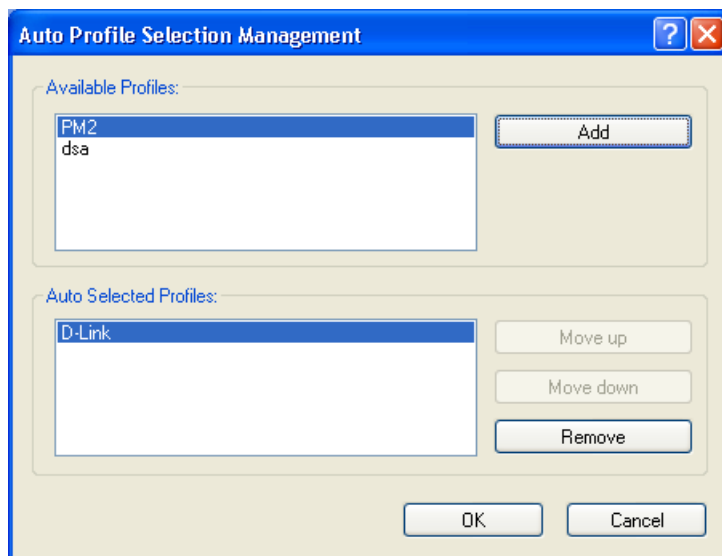
Profile Management - Order Profiles

The Order Profiles section will allow you to select profiles to activate when the computer is turned on or when the DWL-G680 is inserted into the computer.

From the Profile Management menu, click **Order Profiles**.



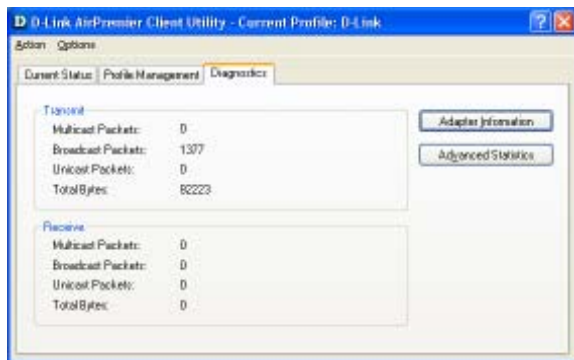
To add a profile to the Auto Selected Profiles list, highlight the profile and click **Add**. The Move Up and Move Down buttons will allow you to prioritize multiple profiles.



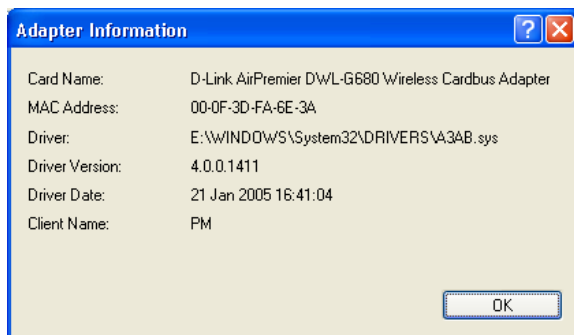
To delete a profile from the Auto Selected Profiles list, highlight the profile and click the **Remove** button.

Note: Profiles must have a SSID specified in order for the profile to show up in the Available Profiles list.

Diagnostics



This screen will display basic statistics for the current wireless connection.

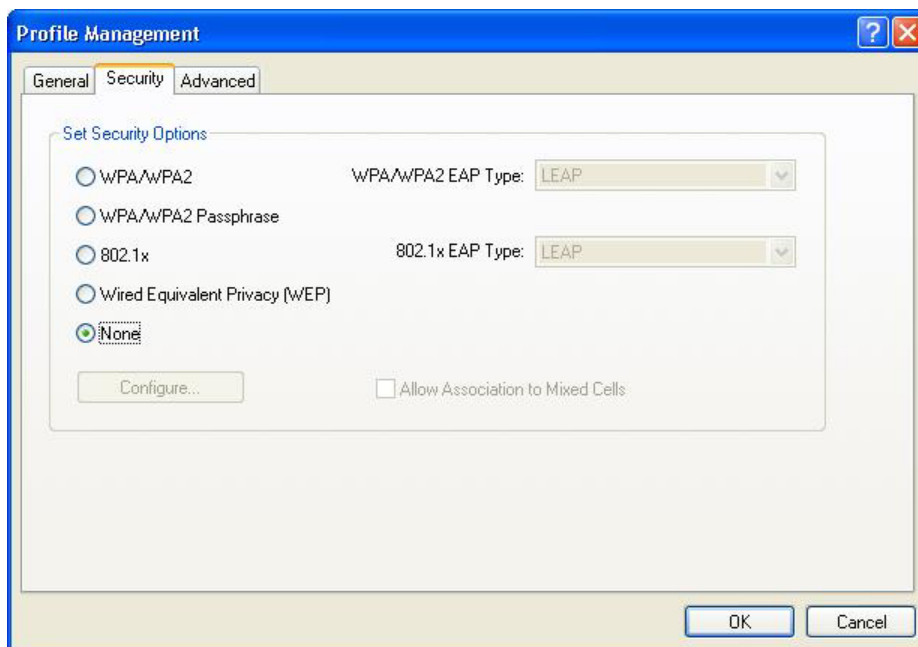


The **Adapter Information** screen will display information regarding the DWL-G680 such as the MAC address and driver version.



The **Advanced Information** screen will display more detailed information regarding your wireless connection.

Security - Overview



WPA/WPA2: Click to use WPA user authentication. Wi-Fi Protected Access (WPA) improves upon WEP security. In conjunction with a RADIUS server and EAP (Extensible Authentication Protocol), WPA ensures that only authenticated users access the network.

WPA/WPA2 Passphrase: Click to use WPA (Passphrase) encryption. WPA-PSK provides user authentication without a RADIUS server in the network. PSK (Pre-Shared Key) provides authentication through use of a passphrase that is shared by the devices on the network. This is the most secure encryption available without a RADIUS server.

802.1x: Click to use authentication. 802.1x requires that a RADIUS server be included in your network in order to authenticate users.

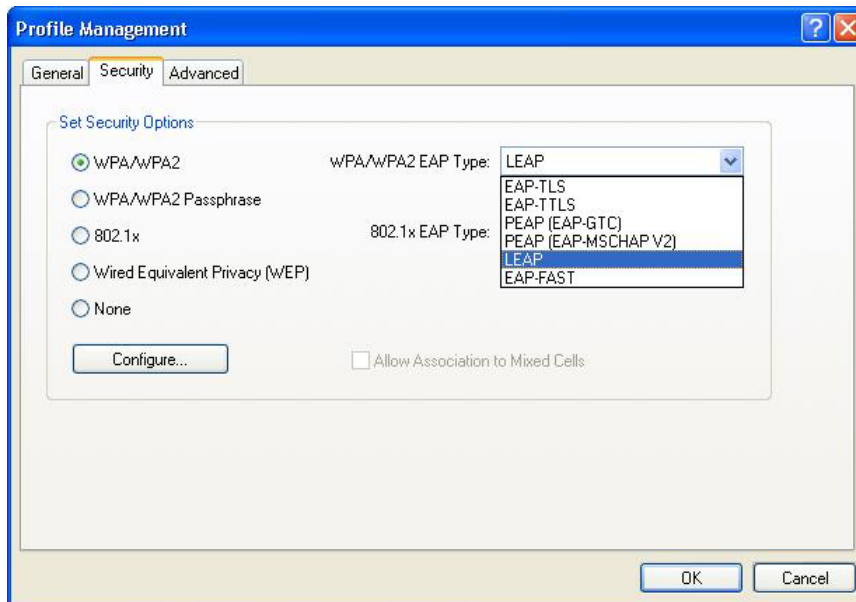
WEP: Click to use Wired Equivalent Privacy (WEP) encryption.

None: Disables security.

Security - WPA/WPA2

Wi-Fi Protected Access (WPA) improves upon WEP security. In conjunction with a RADIUS server and EAP (Extensible Authentication Protocol), WPA ensures that only authenticated users access the network.

To use WPA/WPA2, click the **WPA/WPA2** radio button. Select the Authentication type from the pull-down menu and click the **Configure** button.



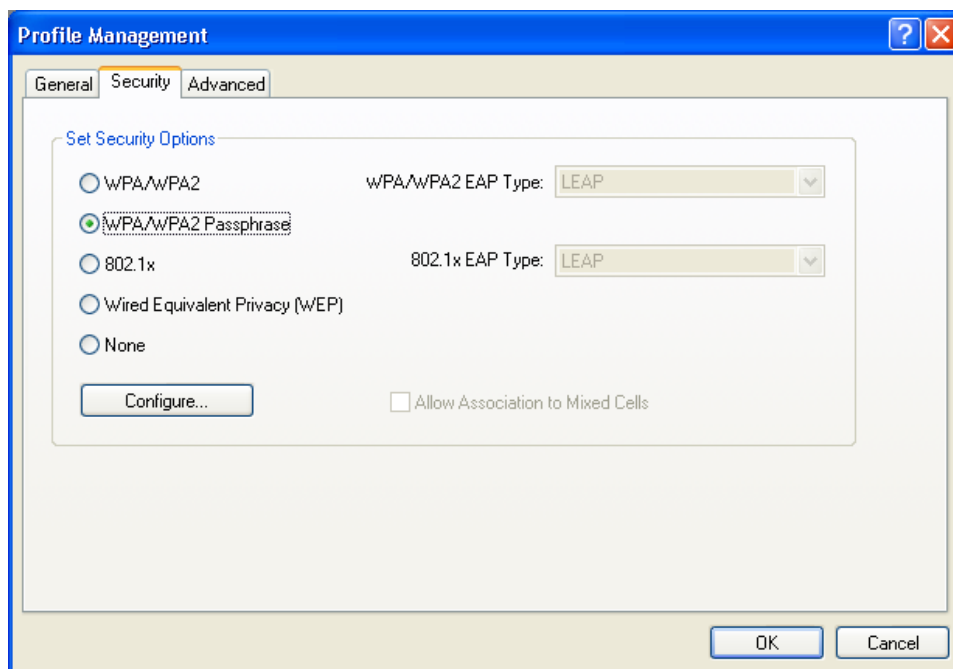
Depending on the type of Authentication you use, you must enter the login/certificate information. Click **OK** to save your settings.

EAP: Extensible Authentication Protocols (EAP-TLS, LEAP, EAP-TTLS, PEAP) allow devices on the network to request authentication from the RADIUS server in the network. All the devices on the network must use the same EAP type when using a RADIUS server for authentication.

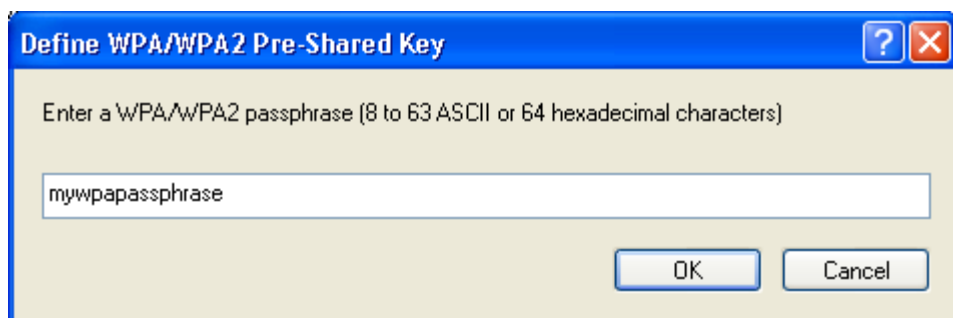
User Certificate: A certificate authority (CA) issues User Certificates to verify that a public key belongs to a specific individual or company.

Security - WPA/WPA2 Passphrase

WPA (passphrase) offers improved data encryption through the **Temporal Key Integrity Protocol (TKIP)**. By using TKIP (Temporal Key Integrity Protocol), the security keys change at set intervals, creating a network that is more secure than one that utilizes WEP encryption alone. Suitable for the home user, WPA Passphrase is a superior form of security that does not require a RADIUS server in the network.



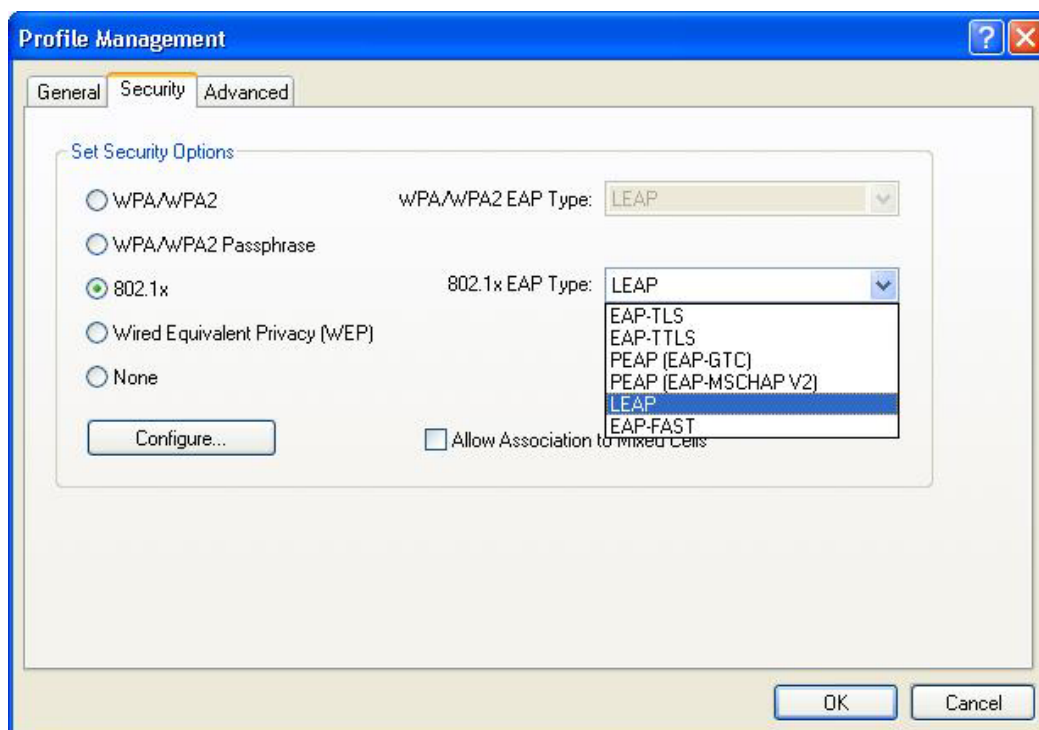
To enable WPA/WPA2 Passphrase, click the radio button next to **WPA/WPA2 Passphrase** and click the Configure button.



Enter a passphrase into the box as seen above. The passphrase is an alpha-numeric password between 8 and 63 characters long and can include symbols (!?*&_) and spaces. This passphrase must be exactly the same on all other wireless devices on your network. Click the **OK** button to save your settings.

Security - 802.1x

802.1x requires that a RADIUS server be included in your network in order to authenticate users. To use 802.1x server authentication, click the **802.1x** radio button. Select the Authentication type from the pull-down menu and click the **Configure** button.



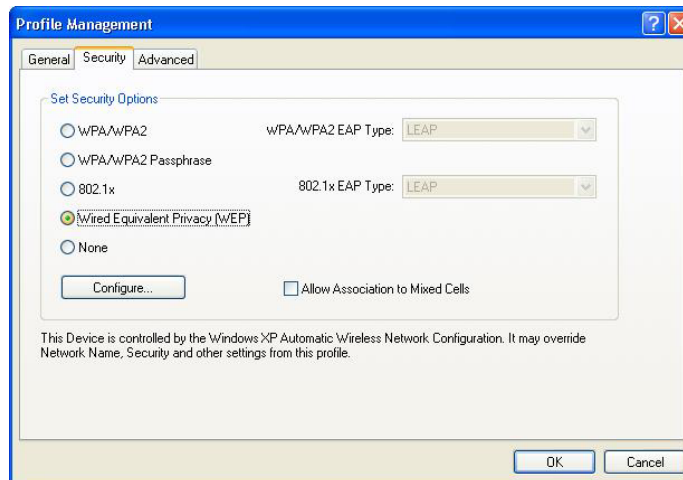
Depending on the type of Authentication you use, you must enter the login/certificate information. Click **OK** to save your settings.

EAP: Extensible Authentication Protocols (EAP-TLS, LEAP, EAP-TTLS, PEAP) allow devices on the network to request authentication from the RADIUS server in the network. All the devices on the network must use the same EAP type when using a RADIUS server for authentication.

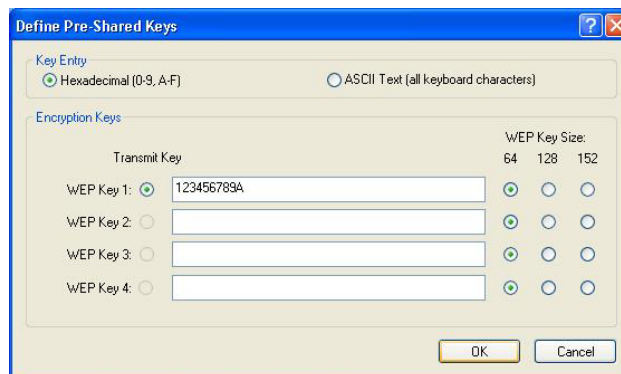
User Certificate: A certificate authority (CA) issues User Certificates to verify that a public key belongs to a specific individual or company.

Security - WEP

WEP (**Wired Equivalent Privacy**) is based on the IEEE 802.11 standard and uses the RC4 encryption algorithm. Enabling WEP allows you to increase security by encrypting data being transferred over your wireless network.



To enable WEP, click the radio button next to **Wired Equivalent Privacy (WEP)** and click the **Configure** button.



Key Entry: Select the WEP key format (Hexadecimal or ASCII)
Hexadecimal - only A-F and 0-9 are valid characters.
ASCII - All numbers and letters are valid characters.

Encryption Keys: Enter a WEP key and then select the encryption level. You can make up to 4 different keys.

WEP Key Size: Select the level of WEP encryption - 64, 128, or 152-bit.

Note: Your network will slow down and wireless signal may degrade when enabling WEP encryption due to the added overhead.

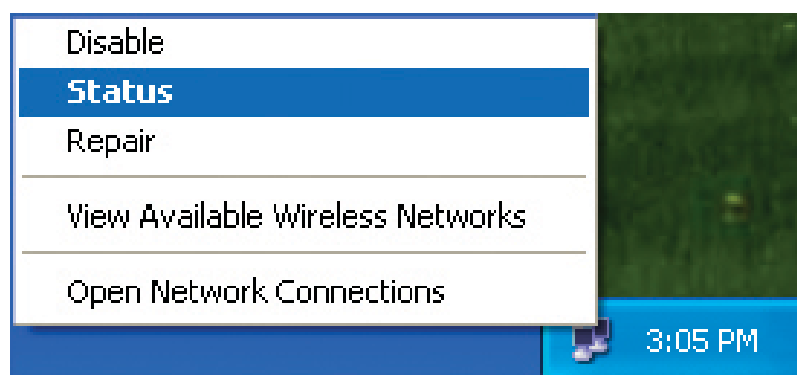


Checking the IP Address in Windows XP

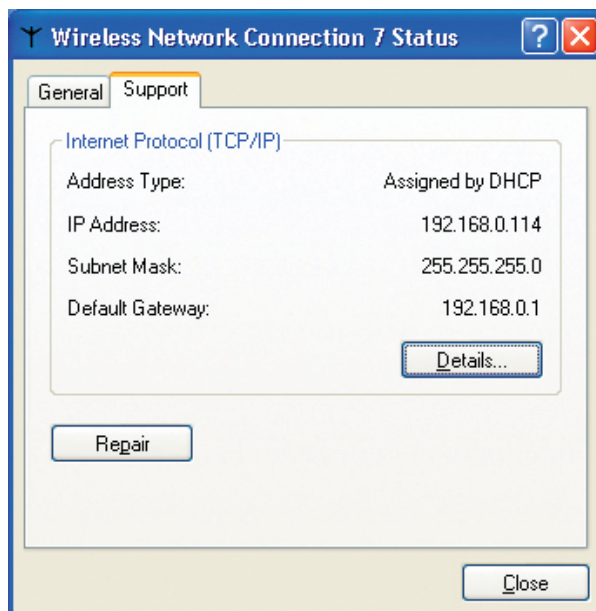

Assigning a Static IP Address in Windows XP/2000

Note: Many broadband routers will automatically assign IP addresses to the computers on the network, using DHCP (Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol) technology. If you are using a DHCP-capable router you will not need to assign static IP addresses.

If you are not using a DHCP capable router, or you need to assign a static IP address, please follow these instructions:

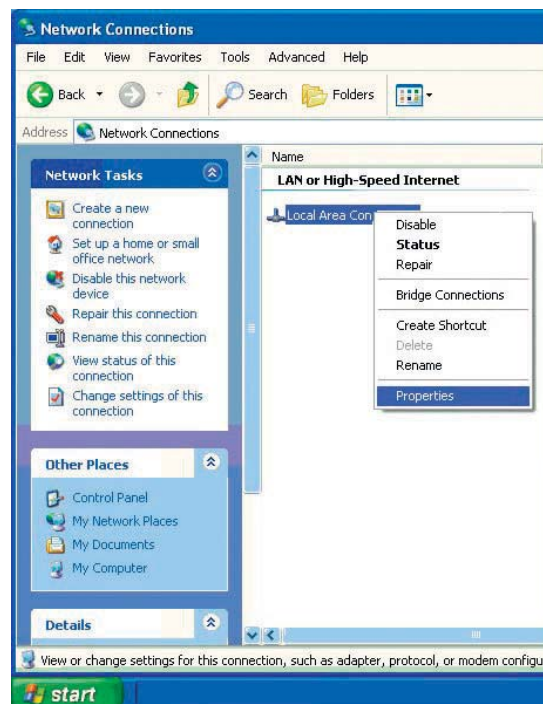
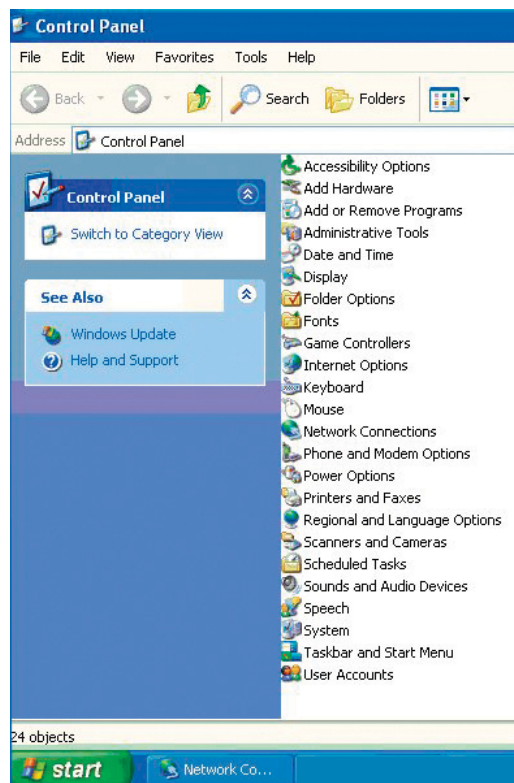

For example, if one computer has an IP address of 192.168.0.2, the other computers should have IP addresses that are sequential, like 192.168.0.3 and 192.168.0.4. The subnet mask must be the same for all the computers on the network.)


Input your DNS server addresses. (Note: If you are entering a DNS server, you must enter the IP address of the Default Gateway.)

The DNS server information will be supplied by your ISP (Internet Service Provider.)

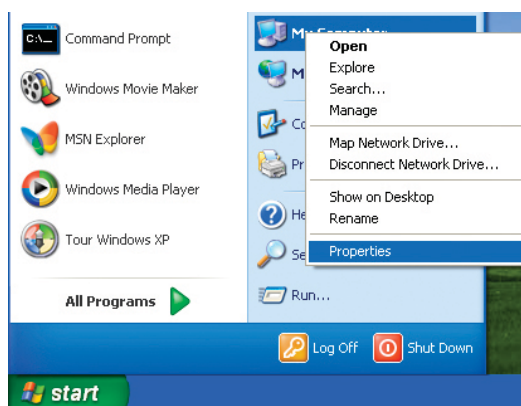
Go to **Start > Run >** type **cmd**. A window similar to this one will appear. Type **ping xxx.xxx.xxx.xxx**, where **xxx** is the **IP address** of the wireless router or access point. A good wireless connection will show four replies from the wireless router or access point, as shown.

Troubleshooting

This chapter provides solutions to problems that can occur during the installation and operation of the DWL-G680. Read the following descriptions if you are having problems. (The examples below are illustrated in Windows XP. If you have another operating system, these solutions will still apply although the appearance on your computer screen may differ.)

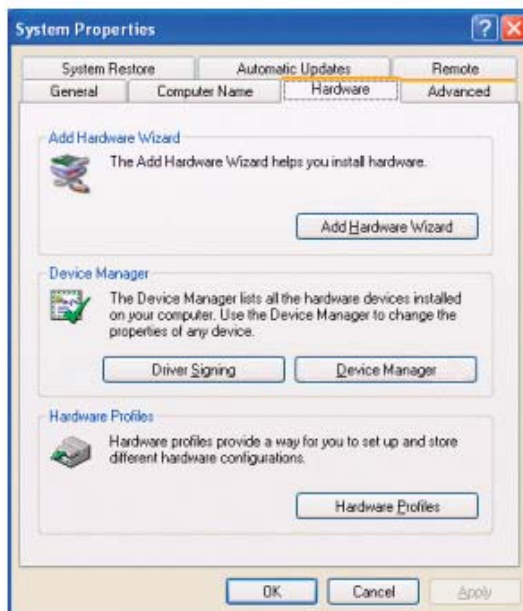
1. How do I check to see that the drivers for the DWL-G680 are installed properly?

Go to **Start > My Computer > Properties**.



Select the **Hardware Tab**.

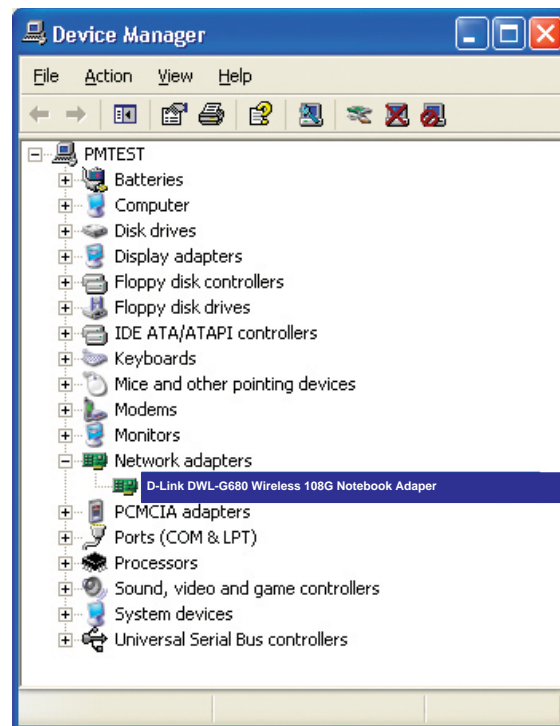
Click **Device Manager**.



Double-click on **Network Adapters**.

Right-click on **D-Link DWL-G680 Wireless 108G Notebook Adapter**.

Select **Properties** to check that the drivers are installed properly.



Look under **Device Status** to check that the device is working properly.



Click **OK**.

2. What variables may cause my wireless products to lose reception?

D-Link products let you access your network from virtually anywhere you want. However, the positioning of the products within your environment will affect the wireless range. Please refer to **Installation Considerations** in the **Wireless Basics** section of this manual for further information about the most advantageous placement of your D-Link wireless products.

3. Why does my wireless connection keep dropping?

If you are using 2.4GHz cordless phones, X-10 equipment or other home security systems, ceiling fans, and lights, your wireless connection will degrade dramatically or drop altogether.

Try changing the channel on your router, access point and wireless adapter to a different channel to avoid interference.

Keep your product away (at least 3-6 feet) from electrical devices that generate RF noise, like microwaves, monitors, electric motors, etc.

4. Why can't I get a wireless connection?






If you have enabled encryption on the DWL-G680, you must also enable encryption on all wireless devices in the network in order to establish a wireless connection.

Make sure that the encryption bit level/TYPE is the same on the AP/router and the DWL-G680.

Make sure that the SSID on the wireless router (if you have one in your network) and the DWL-G680 are exactly the same. If they are not, wireless connection will not be established. The default SSID is **default**.
